

The Peacock is pleased to offer fishing for residents on the Haddon Estate, home to some of the finest and most extensive dry fly fishing for wild trout in the country. Anglers travel from around the world to experience it. The Derbyshire Wye is particularly renowned as the only river in the UK with spring-spawning wild rainbow trout, alongside a thriving population of wild brown trout and grayling.

Day Tickets are available exclusively to hotel residents and guided guests. You'll have access to over seven miles of the River Wye or three and a half miles of the River Derwent. Grayling fishing is also available through the winter months for guided days and hotel residents only.

High Season

- Max 4 rods per river
- Prime dry fly season, with excellent hatches of Mayfly when the time is right.

Low Season

- Max 4 rods per river
- A quieter time of year, but ideal for those seeking a technical, thoughtful day on the water.

Grayling Season

- Max 2 rods per river
- A quieter time of year, but ideal for those seeking a lovely Winter's day searching for the Lady of the Stream.

The Derwent

General description

The Derwent is a peat-coloured river which starts at Ladybower reservoir and runs into the River Trent around Derby.

Fishing stretch

The stretch of The Derwent is approx 3 - 3.5 miles long, bordering with Chatsworth fishery approximately 1 mile upstream of The Peacock at Rowsley car park extending downstream 1 meadow below Hill Carr Sough. We have double bank access.

Fish species

The Derwent contains Wild Brown Trout, Grayling and some Wild Rainbow Trout coming down from the Wye.

Rules

Catch and release and barbless hooks.

Detailed Derwent information

Rod length: 8ft to 10ft. Line weight: 3 - 5 weight for dries in indicator fishing or Euro Nymphing set up. You will be wading, so a good quality pair of chest waders, and wading staff if required.

Flies:

Be observant, match the hatch on the day. Every day can be different!

- · April Large Dark Olives, Sedge, F Fly, Gnats
- · May Blue Winged Olive, Sedge, F Fly, Gnats, Hawthorn, Rusty Spinner, Mayfly
- June Blue Winged Olive, Sedge, F Fly, Gnats, Hawthorn, Rusty Spinner, Mayfly
- July Blue Winged Olive, Sedge, F Fly, Gnats, Hawthorn, Sherry Spinner, Terrestrials
- · August Blue Winged Olive, Sedge, F Fly, Gnats, Hawthorn, Rusty Spinner, Terrestrials
- · September Blue Winged Olives, Large Dark Olives, Sedge, F Fly, Gnats, Needle Fly

Championship Caddis, sizes 13, 15 Griffiths Gnat, sizes 16, 18 and 20 Kilnkhammer, sizes 14, 16, 18, 20

Nymphs: Caddis, Shrimp, Mayfly, Olive patterns


Winter fishing for Grayling

- Barbless hooks, catch and release
- Rod length: 8ft 10ft, 3 -5 weight and Euro Nymphing set ups.
- Leaders' dependant on tactics and water levels. Both Euro Nymphing, indicator and duo method are recommended.

Flies:

All manner of nymphs, weighted and unweighted





The Derbyshire Wye

General description

The Derbyshire Wye is a limestone river (runs clear unless heavy rain) which starts above Buxton and enters The Derwent in Rowsley 300m below Caudwells mill.

Fishing stretch

The stretch is approx 7.5 miles long, starting at the junction with The Derwent, extending to just below Ashford Lake. Approx 7 miles is double bank, with 0.5 miles of single bank at the top boundary.

Fish species

The Wye contains Wild Brown Trout, Grayling and Wild Rainbow Trout.

Rules

Dry fly only, catch and release, no wading and barbless hooks.

Derbyshire Wye information

Rod length: 8ft to 10ft. Line weight: 3 - 5 weight. Leader length: Minimum 9ft up to 12ft, sometimes up to 15ft (wind strength dictates). Tapered leader recommended, and leader strength between 3lb and 5lb. Clothing: dress as drab as possible, try to avoid bright hats.

Flies:

Be observant, match the hatch on the day. Every day can be different!

- April Large Dark Olives, Sedge, F Fly, Gnats
- May Blue Winged Olive, Sedge, F Fly, Gnats, Hawthorn, Rusty Spinner, Mayfly
- June Blue Winged Olive, Sedge, F Fly, Gnats, Hawthorn, Rusty Spinner, Mayfly
- July Blue Winged Olive, Sedge, F Fly, Gnats, Hawthorn, Sherry Spinner, Terrestrials
- August Blue Winged Olive, Sedge, F Fly, Gnats, Hawthorn, Rusty Spinner, Terrestrials
- · September Blue Winged Olives, Large Dark Olives, Sedge, F Fly, Gnats, Needle Fly

Specific flies:

Championship Caddis, sizes 13, 15 Griffiths Gnat, sizes 16, 18 and 20


Winter fishing for Grayling

- No wading
- · Barbless hooks
- · Catch and release
- · Wet fly and dry fly permitted
- Rod length: 8ft 10ft, 3 5 weight and Euro Nymphing set ups.
- Leaders' dependant on tactics and water levels. Both Euro Nymphing, indicator and duo method are recommended.






